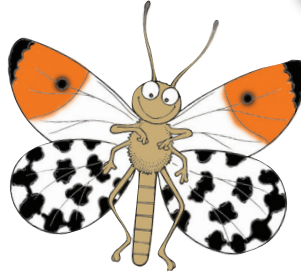




Cloud Watching

Remember: Never look directly at the sun and always wear protective sunglasses when you are outside on a sunny day

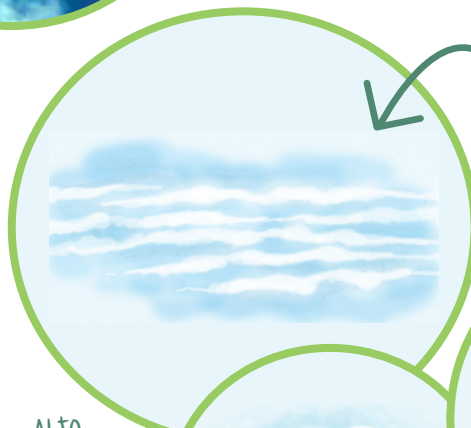
Get Scientific!

Latin words are used to describe what clouds are like. These words are used together to make names for different types of cloud e.g. nimbostratus or altocumulus

"Mackerel skies and mare's tails make lofty ships carry low sails"

This rhyme helps sailors remember that when there are clouds that look like fish scales and clouds that look like horse's tails in the sky at the same time that the weather will turn wet and windy so they should lower their sails.

Do you know any other rhymes that help to predict the weather?



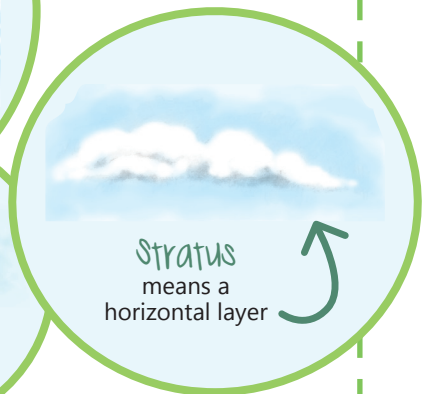
Cirrus
means hair-like or wispy

ALTO
means clouds at medium altitude (height in the sky)



Cumulus
means heaped

Nimbus
means rain-bearing



Stratus
means a horizontal layer
